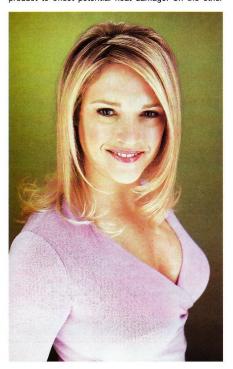
the Hair Doctor

I am very confused by all the conflicting information about hair dryers and blow dryers. Some experts say you should never blow-dry your hair. Other say you can blow-dry for special occasions and other experts say you can blow-dry every day with the proper heat protection products. I am beside myself trying to figure out whether I should blow-dry or not, how often and even what type of heat to use. Can you help?

Celebrity hairstylist Ken Paves recommends that you "blow dry only on weekends or for special times when you want your hair to look absolutely stellar." This practice allows your hair to avoid unnecessary heat style damage but still look great for nights out on the town.

Most hair experts provide hair-drying tips that are specific to hair type, overall condition and styling needs. If your hair is healthy and well-cared for, it may be able to easily handle more regular blow-drying with a protective product to offset potential heat damage. On the other

hand, if your hair is chemically treated, damaged or challenged in any way, blow-drying may only make matters worse and should be avoided except for special events.

Here are some general tips that you can follow:

- · Consult with your hair care specialist about the suggested frequency and proper drying techniques for your hair's type, condition and styling needs. Take notes and follow their suggestions when heat styling your own hair.
- · Be open to alternative hairstyles that eliminate a need for frequent blowdrying. Try side or nape ponytails or ballerina buns.
- Whether your hair is super healthy or fragile, always use a good protection product. Aveda's Elixir Daily Leave-on, Phyto's fabulous PhytoStyle Heat-Protectant Spray and Giovanni's VitaPro Fusion are all designed to counter potential heat styling damage.
- . Keep the nozzle of the blow dryer at least six inches from your hair. Rotate your blow dryer to make sure that no section of hair receives too much direct heat
- · Avoid utilizing high heats over 1800 watts which can definitely scorch hair. Instead, use a medium setting that will dry but not burn tender cuticles.
- When possible, finish with a cool or cold blast of air which will help to seal and set your style.
- · If you feel better about your hair when you dry it on a daily basis, investigate one of the new ion dryers that promise a smoother blow-dry.
- · Even better, consider rolling damp hair in pin curls and sitting under a traditional hood dryer. Conair offers a 1600 watt version with variable airflow settings and an extra large hood to fit over jumbo rollers.

Remember that ultimately you have to decide what works best for your hair, whether it is to blow-dry daily or never at all.

My best friend has just announced her engagement. She recently asked me to be an attendant in the wedding. Sounds great except that she was very specific about the fact that she would design how I would wear my hair for the wedding. This makes me very nervous. Is this normal procedure?

Be glad that your friend has warned you in advance of her wedding hair rulership. Many brides don't spring their bridal hair design requirements on their attendants until after the big bucks have been spent on the dress, shoes and other accessories.

Is this a normal bridal request? Yes. More and more brides are going for a coordinated hair theme complete with matching jeweled hair accessories. Whether you want to comply or not, you need to let your friend know immediately. Since she is expressing her expectations regarding your hair at such an early date don't expect her to back down later.

Some brides are very reasonable asking only that you wear your hair in a predetermined updo or with pre-selected hair gems. Other brides have been known to ask their wedding party to alter the length of their locks. This might be a little much depending on how you feel about your hair.

Communication is the key in this situation. Sit down with the bride and get a clear idea of what her hair designs would entail as well as who pays for what in the strand department. If you are comfortable with her plans and want to be in the wedding, go for it. If her hair ideas are too radical or too costly for you, then explain politely and enjoy your hair any way you want as a wedding guest.



I seem to have hair static all year round. What causes this and how can I avoid it in the future?

Hair static results from a lack of moisture in your hair that bumps up against air that is dry or lacking in moisture for some reason. This can happen more often in the winter months when furnaces and other heating devices suck moisture from the air. However, if your hair is naturally dry or deprived moisture you may be prone to static all the time.

Try some of these tricks to eliminate static from your strands:

- Use a moisturizing shampoo, rinse out conditioner and a leave-in that is appropriate for your hair type and texture.
- Select all natural boar's head brushes and high quality combs which are less likely to add to your static hair tendencies.
- 3. If your hair is still full of static during the day, keep a good leavein conditioner like Phyto7 or 9 in your purse. Massage a little dab of the conditioner into the palms of your hands and lightly smooth the mixture over the top of your strands.
- Choose headgear like headbands, hats and caps that are made of satin, silk or wool which absorbs static. Avoid any synthetic materials which encourage static.
- Lightly spray your brush with a static guard agent then run it over the top of your hair. Spray the static guard product directly onto your hats or hoods to help hold down your tresses when you remove the object.

In a pinch you can also use a fabric-softener sheet and gently run it over your strands to make them behave.

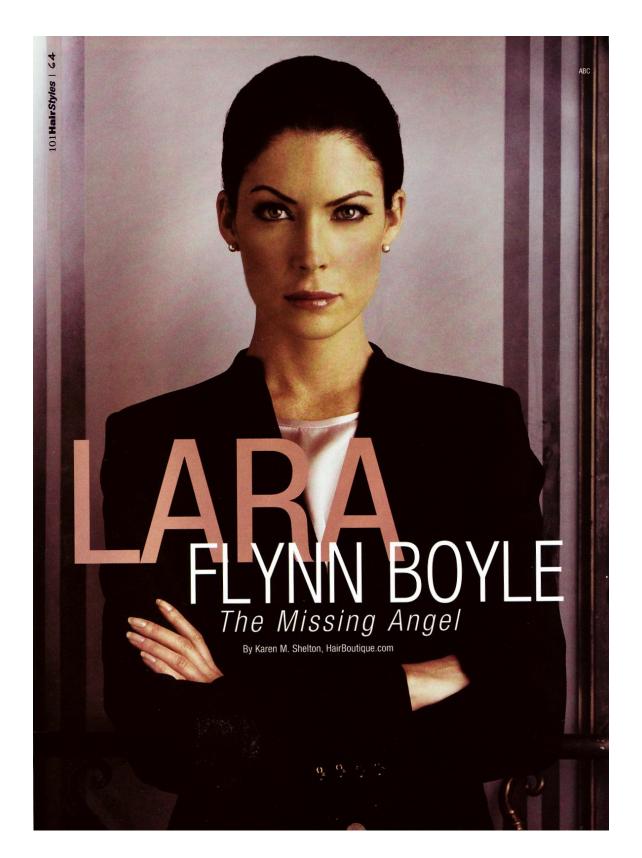

and piles of money, does the lovely Lara Flynn have any crosses to bear? Besides her famous Celtic cross tattooed on her left ankle, she has to deal with very naturally curly hair. Did I say curly? Yes indeed. Ken reported that Lara has lots of medium textured hair that is naturally very curly. I have to admit that I was surprised since I can only remember her with super sleek styles over the past.

Although she has naturally curly hair Ken points out "LF has true Hollywood hair and she transcends style." Comparing her to a modern day version of Elizabeth Taylor, Ken likes to say "LF is a true genius with the creation of her look. She is a genuine movie star who can go from looking like Audrey Hepburn to a Rock & Roll Princess in less than 10 minutes."

Ken, who personally "loves curly hair" and "loves working with curly hair" pointed out that Lara Flynn doesn't let anything slow her down when it comes to trying out new styles. And that includes having lots of gorgeous curls.

Hairwork In Progress

So what are Ken and Lara Flynn currently focusing on for her famous mane? Ken was excited about their ongoing collaboration to grow LF's hair longer. Going for a more distinctive look, her current longer locks are a major departure from the severely cropped look of the recent past. LF's hair, according to Ken, "currently nestles four inches below her collarbone and is in fabulous condition."

Ditching the Gothic black hues of her recent past, Lara Flynn's hair is now a soft, sensuous chestnut color with wonderfully warm honey highlights, compliments of colorist Dwayne Ross, who collaborates with Ken on several of his clients. Lara Flynn's current hair color is a major change from her "one shade from black" hue that produced a completely different and rather severe look.

Although LF's look has "gone full circle from her previous hairstyles" and looks Ken points out "LF can look gorgeous in anything she does." Indeed, Lara Flynn is the darling of the fashion and glamour tomes because of her spectacular ability to morph into completely different styles with the snap of a brush.

Steal Lara Flynn's *About Schmidt* Look

As the Fates would have it, Ken was booked the day of the *About Schmidt* premiere with a magazine shoot. Like a quick-change artist, Ken escaped from the shoot just in time to make a mad dash to LF's home to work his hair magic on her magnificent mane.

So how did he create the spectacular cherub coif? Since he was a little pressed for time, LF washed and conditioned her locks with the Keratese products. Making sure her strands were towel-dried, Lara Flynn was prepped and ready for Ken's whirlwind arrival.

Using his famous blow-dryer, he "dried LF's hair with a very large, all boar's head, round brush to create lots of volume and shape in the root area." Yielding the brush in unison with the dryer's air flow, Ken was able to create lots of hair lift and shape.

Using his handy dandy monster round brush, Ken blew out LF's lush bangs until they were soft and shiny. After the rest of LF's hair was totally dry, Ken covered her entire head, except for the front bang area, in hot rollers that positioned to create voluptuous volume and gentle waves. Using hot rollers in two sizes measuring approximately 1" and 3/4", Ken rolled backwards along the sides and up towards the crown to build in even more volume and shape.

Letting the curls completely set and cool for close to 25 minutes, Ken carefully removed the curlers and then brushed and separated her hair into sections. Using a comb, he teased each individual section at the root to create height. As he finished each section he overlaid it with the next section until he had created the desired shape and fullness.

Being careful to achieve volume and shape without big helmet hair, he also was careful to retail softness and movement that provided a hint of carefully managed tousle. When he was finished with his masterpiece he sprayed Lara Flynn's entire head with old-fashioned Elnett hairspray from France.

When I asked Ken to explain in detail how he got the soft curls and waves to softly nestle at LF's shoulders he laughed "well you know Karen, that's just what I do."

And indeed I did know, having witnessed his magical hair ways firsthand on Jessica Simpson last summer.

Don't hate her because she's beautiful but do hate the fact that she is not in the next *Charlie's Angels* film. She would be a natural *Angel* kicking some bad guy butt while looking spectacular in a retro Kelly Garrett cap. Hello? Does anyone in Hollywood hear me? OK...right. Well at least we all know where a true *Angel* is hanging out waiting to take her gorgeous wings for a spin.



In Hair Profiling I, the first article in the Profiling series, the basic types of hair were covered including Hair Texture, Density, Type and Color.

It was also explained that although your genes control many things about your hair, you could learn to understand your hair and thus encourage optimal performance from the strands nature has given you.

This article provides helpful hints and tips for dealing with your native hair texture and achieving your ultimate tresses.

3. Hot tools. These range the gamut from flat irons for straightness to curling irons and rollers in a variety of sizes and shapes (Conair, Remington, Igia, Helen of Troy).

4. Combination of all options. Depending on the intensity of your hair type such as those with super curly hair or super straight locks, you may need to utilize a variety of tools from chemical treatments down to special conditioners, styling products and hot tools.

HAIR TEXTURE

Hair texture is measured by the degree of fineness or coarseness of your hair, which varies according to the diameter of each individual hair. Hair experts generally agree that there are four major types of hair texture, which include Fine, Medium, Coarse and Wiry.

Within the four texture ranges hair can also be thin, medium or thick density and it can be straight, curly, wavy or kinky. Hair condition will also alter the ultimate equation and can be healthy, normal, oily, dry, damaged or a combination of all conditions.

ALTERING HAIR TEXTURE

Altering hair type, either from curly/wavy to straight or vice versa requires one of the following techniques:

- 1. Permanent chemical applications to add or remove curls/waves. The intensity of the chemicals may range from Thermal Reconditioning (e.g. Yuko), at-home relaxers (PhytoSpecific Relaxers) or at-home perms.
- 2. Special styling systems (shampoo to styling) or standalone products designed to enhance curls/waves (KMS Curl Up) or provide straightness (Phytodefrisant Balm, Mine Smooth Sailing). Phyto offers a volume enhancing system that ranges from volume building shampoos and conditioners to a styling product for root lift. Many of the major hair care manufacturers have similar systems dealing with everything from thin, fine hair to curly/wavy locks.

CONDITION OF HAIR MAKES IT TRICKY

The condition of hair can range from normal, dry, oily/greasy or chemically damaged.

Normal healthy hair that is curly/wavy or straight can usually be chemically altered under the proper conditions without damage. It is possible that chemical processing will make normal hair dry or slightly damaged. If this occurs, a series of deep conditioning treatments should be scheduled along with a switch to a product line designed to reverse dryness and/or dryness.

Chronically dry or damaged hair may need to avoid additional chemical processing until the current damage is neutralized or eliminated. While styling products can be utilized, hot tools should be used sparingly to avoid additional dryness or damage. When possible, a style should be selected that allows your damaged or ultra dry strands to take a breather from styling or processing.

Oily hair is often a good candidate for chemical processing since the formulas may actually eliminate some of the excess oiliness.

When creating your optimal hair care plan, adjust the types of hair care products your use such as shampoo, conditioners and deep treatments to be compatible with your hair's condition. Hair that is damaged will need extra care while hair that is healthy may require minimal deep conditioning treatments. You will have to be your own judge regarding what your hair needs and adjust accordingly.



ALTERING YOUR HAIR TYPEOne thing is certain in the world of hair, many curly and wavy girls crave stick straight strands while the straight ladies crave curls and sexy waves. With the right products and hair care routine, it is possible to switch hair types, at least temporarily.

The first step in altering your hair type is to evaluate the overall condition of your hair. If you are blessed with super healthy tresses, you are a prime candidate for making a quick type change through chemicals, hot tools or specially formulated products.

If your hair is damaged or fragile, your options are more limited but still available in the form of custom styling products, foam or "hair friendly" rollers and hood hair dryers.

Some hair types, whether healthy or not, do not adjust well to chemical treatments. Super curly or wavy hair is extra sensitive and tends to be more prone to dryness and damage. Hair that is fine or thin may also suffer from chemical treatments that cause hair breakage.

When in doubt, consult with your hair care professional before undertaking any drastic type alterations.

HAIR TEXTURE/HAIR TYPE RECOMMENDATIONS

FINE HAIR TEXTURE

Fine hair can be so soft and silky that it can actually feel like feathers. Depending on the type of hair, treatment can vary. Fine hair can range from very thin to very thick. It can be straight, wavy, curly or wiry.

Some experts believe that a perm will help blow out the cuticle on fine hair, giving it great body and movement. Others believe that the chemicals may damage the hair.

Fine hair is often so slippery that it may have a difficult time holding a curl or set. If you lust after a head of bouncy curls, consider using a light mousse on damp strands and using Velcro curlers to create curls.

If your hair does not hold a curl at all, try doing a wet set to lock in more tendrils. Shampoo and towel dry hair, apply a light mousse and then wrap in curlers. Sit under a hood dryer until hair is dry. Carefully remove curlers and then replace with hot rollers. Leave the rollers in until completely cool. Remove curlers and carefully arrange curls with your fingers. Spray with a good holding hairspray to retain the curls.

FINE HAIR - THIN DENSITY

Remedies for fine thin hair should start with a great volumeenhancing cut. The hair should then be maintained with volume building hair care shampoos, products and styling tools.

The right hair care products can be utilized to give hair a thicker appearance, especially for straight strands or hair that is thinner at the root area and fuller near the ends.

The rule of thumb for fine, thin hair should be that a little goes a long way. Avoid regular or heavy hot oils and deep conditioning treatments that can flatten the cuticle resulting in limp, lanky locks. Instead, when warranted, use a light protein pack or hair mask followed by a clarifying shampoo.

Treat according to your hair's needs. If you ends are dry, apply a conditioner only to the ends of your strands.

Perms, straighteners and color applied to fine thin locks may help to swell the hair shaft. The down side to chemical treatments is that fine thin hair tends to be more fragile than other textures and types. Any form of chemical treatments should be considered on an individualized basis and keyed to your hair texture, type and overall condition.

FINE HAIR - MEDIUM DENSITY

Depending on the growth pattern of fine, medium hair, volumeenhancing products may or may not be appropriate. A lot depends on the condition of your hair and whether it is straight, curly or wavy.



Straight hair that grows fuller at the ends but thinner at the roots can benefit from a combination of volume shampoo on the roots and a light moisturizing shampoo formula on the middle and ends of the hair. Follow with a light moisturizing rinse or a detangling spray with moderate conditioning properties.

Use a deep conditioning treatment on dry or damaged ends or middles once a month, or more often as needed. Be careful not to apply hot oils or deep packs close to the roots or you may cause them to become lank or over conditioned. Use a clarifying shampoo once a month if you acquire a lot of styling product building.

FINE HAIR - THICK DENSITY

Although fine hair is still very soft, if it is thick, it would not benefit from a volume enhancing hair care system. Instead, use a moisturizing shampoo and conditioning rinse. A light leave-in conditioner like Phyto's #7 would be appropriate, especially for dry middle or end sections.

If the hair is thick or wavy, it will require more moisturizing treatments include bi-monthly deep conditioning treatments. Remember to concentrate any conditioner only on the ends and middles eliminating contact with the root area.

Fine thick hair is often better able to handle chemical treatments than fine thin hair. Explore options for altering your natural texture with your professional hair consultant if desired.

MEDIUM HAIR TEXTURE

Medium hair is the most common type of texture. It also has the most styling flexibility of the three types. Depending on the overall condition of your hair you may be able to use a shampoo for normal hair followed by a light conditioning rinse or a product that is combined with a detangling spray.

While a deeper conditioning treatment may be advantageous, evaluate your hair's condition and act accordingly. If hair is chemically damaged or dry, treat with a regular moisturizing hair care regime followed by weekly deep conditioning masks or hot oil treatments.

MEDIUM HAIR - THICK DENSITY

Medium hair that is thick can require some special expertise in achieving the proper balance and style because of the potential for excess bulkiness.

Although medium textured thick hair is ideal for almost all type of chemical treatments, it is important to keep hair well shaped and conditioned to minimize thickness. Longer hair will help compress some of the mass while gentle relaxing treatments will add bend and movement.

To maintain this hair texture and type in optimal condition use a regular moisturizing shampoo, conditioning rinse and leave-in conditioner. Utilize hot oil and deep conditioning masks on a monthly basis, or as needed to keep hair soft and to help it lay flatter.

If oiliness at the roots and dryness near the ends is a problem, use a combination of products to address each challenge. Use a clarifying shampoo on the roots only. Apply moisturizing shampoo on the middle and ends. This will provide a balanced cleansing treatment. Remember to only condition the sections of hair that will benefit directly from moisturizing.

Achieve increased resilience and shape-holding power from setting lotions, mousses and hair sprays. Medium textured hair hold sets well although the thicker the hair, the higher the risk that the weight of the hair will pull the curls or waves out.

When medium hair is in good, undamaged condition, it also benefits from flat and curling irons and hot curling tools. When used with a heat protectant product, medium thick hair can also better withstand regular blow-drying than other hair textures and types.

It should however be noted that the use of hot tools can have a drying effect on any type including medium thick hair if used too frequently or without a leave-in conditioning or heat protection product.

COARSE & WIRY HAIR TEXTURE

Coarse hair can feel heavy and rough as a result of the way that the cuticle scales lie flat against the hair shaft. Coarse or wiry hair can also be medium or fine.

Depending on the coarseness of the hair and whether it is dry or damaged, use a moisturizing shampoo adjusted to the current condition of the hair. It may also be appropriate to perform a regular pre-conditioning treatment followed by a heavier leave-in conditioner like Phyto #9 with Macadamia oil.

Moisturizing shampoo can range from a light formula to very heavy. Different shampoos and conditioners can perform different functions. Moisturizing properties will vary by manufacturer and ingredients.

Coarse and wiry hair textures are not always the best candidates for chemical treatments. A lot depends on the shape of the cuticle and whether hair is curly, wavy or kinky. The overall condition of the hair plays a key role in the success of chemical applications.

Whether you have fine, medium, coarse or wiry textured hair that is thin, medium or thick, it can also be normal, oily, dry or damaged. Remember as you customize a hair care program that provides maximum benefit for your own hair profile, be willing to adjust according to each of the variables that define your hair. Since everyone's hair is uniquely their own, the hair care systems that they select must also be individualized and personalized.

DO YOU HAVE THIN/FINE HAIR THAN NEEDS VOLUME?

Hair is either thin, medium or thick. How do you tell the difference? If you can basically see your scalp when your hair is wet your hair is probably thin.

Hair experts suggest that a good way to measure whether

hair is thick or thin is to pull it into a ponytail. Thick hair is very full and requires both hands to hold it. Thin hair is about the size of a Naya water cap. Anything in the middle is medium in thickness, which is what most people have. Don't despair if you have thin hair. Both Uma Thurman and Gwyneth Paltrow have thin hair and this has not stopped them from fame and fortune.

Besides being small in diameter, thin hair is often stick straight and will not easily hold a curl or waves. It also can be so soft and thin that is can be hard to control. While the good news is that thin hair is silky, it can also be prone to static electricity and weightlessness.

FAT HAIR PRODUCTS

Although many hair specialists recommend color and perming as good "hair fattening" options, thin hair may be damaged if chemicals are not applied with extreme care. This is because thin hair is more delicate and fragile than other types of hair.

Volume enhancing products that bolster and reinforce hair

come in all forms from shampoo and rinse out conditioners to leave in creams, gels, lotions, sprays and foams. Some of the products, like Matrix Essential's Vavoom Volumizing Foam are lightweight but deliver maximum volume, lift and body to any style. Many of the maximizing products are designed to be brushable with a lasting memory and many contain thermal protectants and PABA-free sunscreen.

If your hair is color or chemically treated the volumizers may swell the hair cuticle so that the color or chemical treatments fades faster than normal.

Before you purchase one of the volume building hair care products discuss this potential problem with your stylist or one of the consultants at the beauty store where you buy the product. When in doubt write to the manufacturer and inquire if there is any potential loss of chemical color or other treatments.

Most of the volume products are light and will create a wonderful swelling and fullness. However, not all products work as well as others and some volume enhancing products are known to create stickiness, stiffness or a tacky sensation.

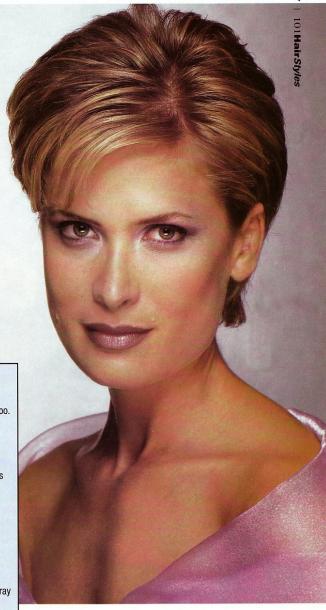

Styling Hair To Maximize Volume



If you want to try a volume product but are unsure or the outcome, buy the smallest amount you can for a trial.

The best approach for using any of the volumizing products is to first apply the product at the roots and then carefully comb it or work it through the ends. By applying the product at the roots you can give the hair more lift and separation which helps build in the volume.
